

Topic > There are those who Corrupt the Word of God

In the time of the Apostle Paul, there where those who were aready handling his "Word of God" deceitfully.

What about the time that we live in? Are there millions of people being deceived by the 300 plus supposedly 'new improved' bibles?

2nd Corinthians 4:2 KJV "But have renounced the hidden things of dishonesty, not walking in craftiness, nor handling the word of God deceitfully; but by manifestation of the truth commending ourselves to every man's conscience in the sight of God."

1st Thessalonians 2:13 KJV "For this cause also thank we God without ceasing, because, when **ye** received the word of God which **ye** heard of us, **ye** received it not as the word of men, but as it is in truth, the word of God, which effectually worketh also in **you** (Plural) that believe."



"And thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up."

You Cannot have an Accurate English Bible Without the <u>Thee, Thou, Ye, You!</u> (as in the King James Bible)

Proverbs 30:5 KJV "Every word of God is pure: he is a shield unto them that put their trust in him."

As a 'reason' to use modern versions, many people complain about the King James' English, not realizing that their reasoning is unfounded - in all cases. One issue is the supposedly 'archaic' use of Thee, Thou, Ye, etc. The King James Bible is actually far superior to the modern versions by its use of these pronouns. The King James Bible uses 'biblical' English that is superior to anything published in modern 'bible' versions.

It can be seen in the list below, the King James' pronouns distinguish between the subject and object forms of the pronouns and also distinguish between the singular and plural use of those pronouns. The modern versions not only lose information by eliminating this distinction, but they change the meaning of the text, and thereby change doctrine as well.

Deuteronomy 12:32 KJV "What thing soever I command you, observe to do it: thou shalt not add thereto, nor diminish from it."

In the King James Bible, when a person says *thou* or *thee*, he is **talking to** one person. When he says *ye* or *you*, he is talking to a group.

Here is how the second-person pronouns are used in sentences:

Thou wast in the next room. (*one person*, *subject*)

Ye were in the next room. (several people, subject)

I saw **thee** in the next room. (**one person**, object)

I saw **you** in the next room (**several people**, object)

That is **thy** room. (**one person**, possessive)

That is **your** room. (**several people**, possessive)

That room is **thine**. (*one person*, *predicate possessive*)

That room is **yours**. (**several people**, predicate possessive)
